#### How to do a 'binterrogation'

- 1. Ideally do the binterrogation across a week between bin collections and 'binterrogate' your recycling bin one week and your rubbish bin the next.
- 2. Use the Binterrogator to record and count the items you throw away in each bin, either when you throw it away or wait until the bin is full and do it all at once.
- 3. Try to complete each column below is a completed binterrogation to help you.
- 4. If the item can't be reused/upcycled use the Surrey Recycles search tool and app to help you see what you could recycle and how.
- 5. Visit surreyep.org.uk to find the search tool and for other ideas, inspiration and know-how.
